## Important Facts to Remember

For promotion to the next grade level:

- At least $\underline{5}$ credits must be earned for a student to be considered a sophomore.
$\square$ At least 11 credits must be earned for a student to be considered a junior.
- At least $\mathbf{1 7}$ credits must be earned for a student to be considered a senior.
- At least $\underline{23}$ credits must be earned for a student to GRADUATE!!!

A transcript is a record of all the classes taken in high school and includes grades and credits for ALL classes, whether pass or fail.

All grades count toward the overall GPA (Grade Point Average) and earning credits for graduation.

All academic and world language courses count for the HOPE/Zell Miller Grade Point Average. You can continually monitor HOPE/Zell Miller eligibility through GAfutures.org.

- In order to be eligible for sports, students must be on track with credits \& earn at least 2.5 credits the previous semester.
- If you are an athlete and plan to play sports in college, to be eligible for NCAA Division 1 or II college athletics, a student must register with the NCAA Eligibility center. It is the student/parent's responsibility to be sure that all requirements are met. Please refer to www.eligibilitycenter.org for more information.
- To be eligible to play college athletics at an NAIA-sanctioned school, a student must register with the NAIA Eligibility Center. It is the student/parent's responsibility to be sure that all requirements are met. Please refer to www.playnaia.org for more information.

## 4 English Credits:

- Ninth Lit
- World Lit
- American Literature OR AP Lang
- 1 Additional English Credit: British Lit, Advanced Comp, AP Lit, or DE English)

4 Math Credits:

- GSE Algebra I or Algebra: Concepts and Connections
- GSE Geometry or Geometry: Concepts and Connections
- GSE Algebra II or Advanced Algebra: Concepts and Connections
- 1 Additional Math Course: (Pre-Calculus, AP Statistics, AP Calculus, Statistical Reasoning, Advanced Math Decision Making, Advanced Financial Algebra, or DE math course) (Some students took Foundations of Algebra which counts as a math for graduation purposes, but students planning to attend a 4-year college will need additional math.)


## 4 Science Credits

- Biology
- Physics OR Physical Science
- Chemistry, Environmental Science, OR Earth Systems
- 1 Additional Science Course


## 3 Social Studies Credits

- World History
- US History
- Government/Economics (. 5 credit each, unless taking AP which are full credits each)


## 3 Credits of CTAE, World Language, or Fine Arts

- 3 credits - Do not have to all be in the same category. Example: Student could have 1 CTAE credit, 1 World Language credit, and 1 Fine Arts credit and meet requirements.
- For admission to a 4-year college or university, 2 credits of the same World Language is required.


## 1 Health/Personal Fitness Credit OR 3 credits of JROTC

4 Additional Elective Credits (Examples include: Weight Training, Team Sports, Psychology, Mythology, etc.)

## World Language Courses:

Taking a World Language course is NOT required for graduation, but students who wish to gain admission to a college/university must complete two (2) units of the same World (foreign) Language.

Like CTAE and Fine Arts, students may be a pathway completer if 3 sequential World

Language courses are completed.

## Being a Pathway Completer

All students are strongly encouraged to select a Plan of Study/Pathway and complete a sequence of 3 courses in one of the following areas:

- CTAE
- Advanced Academics
- Fine Arts
- World Language


## How are Advanced Placement/Honors classes beneficial to the student's GPA?

## Honors weight is not factored into HOPE GPA.

For example: Student earns an 80 in Honors American Literature the report card and transcript will reflect an 85 as the weighted points are added to the final average.

ـ Advanced Placement courses add 10 points to the final grade, if a 70 or above has been earned.

For HOPE, an extra . 5 weight is added to unweighted AP grade.

## Academic Plan

- Students will be viewing their IGP (Individual Graduation Plan) in advisement in the winter, parents will then be allowed to go into IC to view student's plans and to sign off on them. The IGP (Individual Graduation Plan) is in the IC Student Portal
- The academic courses listed (blue) are recommended by subject area teachers. The electives (green) are selected by the student.
- All requests for schedule changes for both semesters of next year must be made during the first five days Fall semester. No schedule requests will be made after this time.



## YouScience

An aptitude assessment. Uses a series of 9 science-based brain games and an interest survey to uncover a students' aptitudes and interests.

## Each students YouScience profile:

- Is a scientific measurement of natural aptitudes and interests as a basis for career recommendations
- Is a comprehensive profile including aptitude, interest, and personality assessments, extensive personal feedback, and career and educational recommendations

Answers these questions:

- What do you do well?
-What do you enjoy?
- How to prepare?
- What are the market needs in terms of careers?



## PSAT

> The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test provides a standardized view of a student's scholastic skills, and helps students compare themselves with other collegebound students nationwide.
> The State of Georgia pays for all first-time Sophomores with the opportunity to take the PSAT at no cost to the student.
> This test is taken in October of the students Sophomore year during the school day. This year the test will be given online and will be administered over five days the week of October $23^{\text {rd }}$. Detailed information if forthcoming.
> The PSAT/NMSQT can qualify you for the National Merit Scholarship program and other scholarships.

## SAT \& ACT

If you are planning to attend a four-year college/university, you may need to take the ACT or SAT for acceptance. Many Georgia colleges are waiving test requirements based on a student's Grade Point Average. Please research your schools carefully.

If you qualify for Free or Reduced Lunch and have completed the application for this year, you are eligible for SAT and ACT fee waivers which allow you to take both test two times for free $\left(11^{\text {th }} \& 12^{\text {th }}\right.$ graders only). - Aptitude exam required for entrance into the military that determines your eligibility for military jobs.
- Will be given at PCHS during both $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ semester.

- JROTC instructors will be posting QR codes to register the week prior to the test.

## If a student does not have these three key fields correct in our Student Information System as well as in their GAFutures <br> Profile, there will be no eligibility for the HOPE Program: <br> All of the above items must match on

- Birth Date

- College Admissions Documents
- SAT or ACT Testing Documents

- Familiarize yourself with GAfutures. If you have not already created an account, do so. There is a lot of valuable information listed on this website.
- This is the website that you will visit to check your HOPE GPA (remember this is different than the school GPA that is posted on your transcript), and GAfutures is the only place to check this. See informational HOPE GPA video here. If you cannot see your HOPE GPA, you will need to make sure your SSN and date of birth are correct in your Profile in GAfutures.
- GAfutures also has information about scholarships and state aid programs, FAFSA and Financial Aid, career exploration, and many more valuable resources. Next year, you can also apply to some in-state colleges/universities and request that your transcripts be sent to in-state colleges through GAfutures.

## Minimum Day (SENIORS ONLY)

## - Students who have met the following can apply for Minimum Day

- Students must have earned enough credits to have senior status by the end of $11^{\text {th }}$ grade year.
- Students must have passed or be enrolled in the specified courses for high school graduation recorded on the transcript audit and the Senior Letter requirement page.
- Students must have participated in an advisement conference with the school counselor to discuss important topics/opportunities such as, but not limited to Dual Enrollment, WorkBased Learning, the importance of rigorous courses including full time student and admission requirement topics, Academic, CTAE, Fine Arts and World Language pathways and pathway completion information, HOPE scholarship eligibility, etc.
- Students may be released for one (1) BLOCK class period per day (Either $1^{\text {st }}$ or $4^{\text {th }}$ block). Students cannot be DE or WBL students and take advantage of Minimum Day.

- A process by which high school students take courses from a state public or private postsecondary institution while still enrolled as a high school student and receive credit both at the high school and at the postsecondary institution.
- Students are eligible for CTAE courses (example: welding) beginning in $10^{\text {th }}$ grade and College Core Courses (example: ENGL 1101) in the $11^{\text {th }}$ grade.
